Washington Office Update

Karen Dante, Climate Change Adaptation and Policy Specialist, Office of Sustainability and Climate Change (OSCC)

- The OSCC is leading the effort to revise the Climate Change Performance Scorecard. Action-oriented, outcome-oriented, and program-oriented alternatives were presented during recent webinars for field regional climate coordinators and field officers/line officers. Feedback will guide development of a preferred framework, followed by additional webinars and opportunities for broader involvement.
- A press release and information about the Climate Adaptation Leadership Awards will be available soon. The awards, created in response to the Council on Environmental Quality's <u>Climate and Natural Resources Priority Agenda</u>, will be presented next spring.

USDA Climate Hubs Update

- Regional Climate Hub leaders met and exchanged ideas during their recent annual meeting in Washington, DC.
- All regional Vulnerability Assessments <u>have been posted</u>. Some will be developed as peer-reviewed journal articles to further assist users and support the National Climate Assessment.
- Workshops on Building Blocks for Climate Smart Agriculture & Forestry are ongoing.
- Applications are due November 20 for the Climate Hubs Fellows Program.

- The Southeast Regional Climate Hub's Vulnerability Assessment has been published.
- The Appalachian Landscape Conservation Cooperative has released <u>Ecosystem Benefits and Risks</u> and a companion <u>Guide to Ecosystem Services</u>, online tools developed collaboratively with the Eastern Threat Center and the University of North Carolina Asheville's National Environmental Modeling and Analysis Center.
- Forest Service Associate Chief Mary Wagner recently met with SRS employees in Asheville and engaged in discussions about climate change research and Hub activities.
- The Eastern Threat Center will host the <u>2016 meeting</u> of the US-International Association for Landscape Ecology, themed "Landscape Change," in Asheville, April 3-7. <u>Abstract submissions</u> are due December 15.

National Forest System Updates

Leslie Brandt, Climate Change Specialist (Northern Institute of Applied Climate Science), Eastern Region

- A climate-informed monitoring workshop held last month at Great Lakes National Forest led to development of climate change monitoring questions to support training requirements.
- Scientist Maria Janowiak attended the Society of American Foresters annual convention and participated on a panel, gave a talk on climate inventories, and presented a poster on vulnerability assessment.
- Climate Change Outreach Specialist Patricia Butler recently led training for personnel from the Wayne National Forest and Ohio Division of Forestry who are applying the <u>Adaptation Workbook</u> to oak-hickory management projects.
- Forest Adaptation Planning and Practices training workshops will be held in <u>North Woodstock</u>, <u>NH</u>, November 18-19, and <u>Smithfield</u>, RI, November 20-21.

Emrys Treasure, Ecosystems Management Coordinator (detail), Southern Region

- The forests and the region have completed Scorecard reporting from last year and are working on a regional summary to identify needs, opportunities, and actions for this year.
- Work is underway to support the needs of national forests transitioning monitoring programs to the requirements of the 2012 Planning Rule, including monitoring measurable changes related to climate change and other stressors. The region is leveraging the Rule's broader-scale monitoring concept through development of a strategy to collect, analyze, and deliver information that is relevant to more than a single plan area. - The Francis Marion National Forest released its <u>Draft Revised Land and Resource Management Plan and Draft Environmental</u> <u>Impact Statement</u>, which address climate change and sea level rise through a monitoring-driven adaptive management framework.
