#### Washington Office Updates (Research and Development)

#### Randy Johnson, National Program Leader, Genetics and Global Change Research

- The Interagency Land Management Adaptation Group (ILMAG) is compiling Vulnerability Assessments in a database. Send these to Randy (<a href="mailto:randyjohnson@fs.fed.us">randyjohnson@fs.fed.us</a>). ILMAG is also working on a managed relocation ("assisted migration") project. Contact Randy for details.
- Reviewers are needed for the next Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) report. The process is ongoing.
- Toral Patel-Weynand has compiled and submitted input on the National Climate Assessment draft.
- Dave Cleaves' group is working on National Forest carbon reporting and tools.
- Randy sent scientists an announcement about NASA ROSES (Research Opportunities in Space and Earth Sciences). NOAA, NASA, and DOE established a joint solicitation for carbon cycle research. This is expected to be the main funding source for the next two years.
- There is a lot of discussion about climate change scenarios. The ILMAG needs consistent scenarios and datasets for land management planning. Contact Randy to provide input.

#### Southeast Climate Science Center (SECSC) Update

#### **Gerald McMahon, Director**

- The SECSC recently requested proposals for FY13-14 projects. A statement of interest identified two categories: water governance and local-scale climate adaptation decisions. Directed project categories include downscaling in Puerto Rico and sea level rise Vulnerability Assessment. More information: http://www.doi.gov/csc/southeast/index.cfm.
- A directed project will relate to the Fish and Wildlife Service/LCC Southeast Adaptation Strategy effort. A student will synthesize conservation objectives (examples: longleaf pine restoration and open space conservation). The SECSC hopes to coordinate with the FS.

#### **National Forest System Updates**

#### David Meriwether, Ecosystems Management Coordinator, Southern Region

- The Southern Region's climate change steering team recently met and discussed establishing Scorecard milestones, bringing research to managers in the field through technology transfer (workshops and training), and demonstrating climate science applications in forest plans. The steering team will propose a session for the joint Southern Region/Southern Research Station leadership team meeting in May.

## Leslie Brandt, Climate Change Specialist, Northern Institute of Applied Climate Science, Eastern Region

- The Central Hardwoods Vulnerability Assessment is almost complete and will be out for scientific review soon. A Vulnerability Assessment for the Appalachians will begin soon.
- The Forest Adaptation Resources document that was developed for Wisconsin is being revised for the Eastern Region.
- Demonstration projects with partners on the Superior and Chequamegon-Nicolet National Forests are moving forward.
